

Recommendation: It is recommended that the State Board review and discuss the Policy Development Priorities and Master Calendar for the coming year.

Background: Each year, the State Board establishes their policy development priorities at the State Board Retreat in June. Department staff then reviews these priorities and develops a proposal for addressing the priorities at upcoming State Board meetings throughout the year. This plan for addressing the priorities is incorporated into the State Board Master Calendar.

Statutory responsibilities that occur on a regular basis (i.e., approving teacher preparation programs, AEA budgets, community college and AEA accreditation, etc.),

leadership and advocacy activities (i.e., legislative reception, joint meetings with stakeholder groups), and information sessions (i.e., work sessions, some reports) are also placed on the Master Calendar at that time. The Master Calendar is then brought to the State Board for review and possible revision. This State Board Master Calendar forms the basis for State Board meeting agendas for the coming year.

At the June Retreat, State Board members identified Policy Development Priorities for 2009-2010. Department staff has reviewed the priorities and developed a proposal for addressing them during the coming year.

This session will include both a discussion of the Policy Development Priorities and Master Calendar for 2009-2010, and an overview of the process that is used to develop the agenda for each State Board meeting.

Process Used to Develop State Board of Education Meeting Agendas*

1. State Board members establish their policy development priorities at the State Board Retreat in June.
2. Department staff review these priorities and develop a proposal for addressing the priorities at upcoming State Board meetings throughout the year. This plan for addressing those **policy development priorities** is incorporated into the State Board Master Calendar.
3. **Statutory responsibilities** that occur on a regular basis (i.e. approving teacher preparation programs, AEA budgets, community college accreditation), **leadership and advocacy activities** (i.e. legislative reception), and **information sessions** (i.e. legislative updates) are also placed on the Master Calendar. The Master Calendar then goes to the State Board for review and possible revision.
4. The Master Calendar forms the basis for all State Board agendas. The Master Calendar is a working document. Sometimes the timelines for addressing an issue need to be adjusted or emerging issues need to be added (i.e. new rules must be noticed and adopted because of legislative activity).
5. The agendas for the monthly meetings start with the topics that are listed on the Master Calendar for that month. Additional topics may be added. Examples of the circumstances under which a topic might be added include:
 - The Board agrees that a topic needs to be addressed (i.e. Board members want additional information about a particular issue).
 - Items are submitted from the field that require Board action (i.e. nonpublic school accreditation requests).
 - Emerging issues are identified (i.e. Race to the Top).Topics on the Master Calendar are sometimes shifted to a different month to even out the workload on the monthly agendas, to accommodate presenters' schedules, or to adjust for timeline changes in long-term projects.
6. At the end of each meeting a list of topics tentatively scheduled for the next Board meeting is shared with the Board. At that time Board members may suggest changes or modifications to the list of topics for the next meeting, or Board information needs related to the topics.
7. Draft meeting agendas are reviewed with the State Board President as requested.
8. Final agendas and meeting materials are mailed out to all Board members in the State Board meeting notebooks.
9. The agenda is approved at the beginning of each Board meeting.

***This process is designed so that State Board meeting time is focused on the priorities that have been established by the Board and on the Board's statutory responsibilities.**

Vision: Iowa students will become productive citizens in a democratic society, and successful participants in a global community.

Statement of Mission: Our Mission is to champion excellence for all Iowa students through leadership and service.

State Board Policy Development Priorities

As the world continues to change, we must continuously assess our education system to assure that we are preparing students for the challenges of the 21st century. Advances in technology and globalization are changing the way we live, connect with each other, communicate, and work. We dare not rely on the same traditional school system, but must adapt in order to prepare our students for the world of today and the future.

In order to facilitate these changes, the State Board of Education has selected three policy development priorities for 2009-2010: **Innovation, Engagement, and Quality**. Following are brief notes from the Board's discussion of these issues at the State Board Retreat, and plans for addressing these priorities at board meetings throughout the coming year:

Innovation

Notes from State Board and Department discussion:

Why are we promoting innovation?

- What is the purpose of innovation?
- What do we get from it?

What does innovation mean for Iowa students? How have students and their needs changed?

- Use of technology has changed.
- The way students communicate has changed – we must engage students differently.
- The skills that students will need for jobs in the 21st century continue to change.

The World is Flat may have contributed to the sense that there is a need for change. Change requires going outside our comfort zone.

This may be a critical time to promote innovation. Circumstances are creating opportunities.

In order to spark ideas we need to look at very innovative programs and practices both in and out of Iowa.

Technology – how will this change instruction and how does it relate to innovation, engagement and quality?

The State Board could identify and showcase innovative practices.

- Identify innovative practices across all sectors – preschool, K-12, community college, teacher preparation, AEAs.
- Invite representatives from innovative programs to present at State Board meetings and be recognized by the Board. Alternatively, the State Board could go onsite to see innovative practices in action.
- Showcase innovative practices across the state – some ideas:
 - ❖ Highlight innovative practices in a State Board newsletter.
 - ❖ Highlight these programs on our website.
 - ❖ Develop a press release to be used locally when the State Board recognizes a local program.
 - ❖ Consider developing other mechanisms to highlight best practices – social media such as Facebook and Twitter, DVD, webcasts or podcasts.

Technology Task Force

- Create a task force to look at how technology is changing and explore how we can facilitate the use of technology to improve instruction and increase student performance.
- Frame the task force discussion around the Iowa Core Curriculum and the 21st century essential concepts and skills that students will need in the area of technological literacy.
- Distance education is one critical delivery system for helping students attain these skills.

What is the role of charter schools?

- What have we learned from charter schools that we wouldn't have known without them? (Being "different" just to be different is not enough.)
- What criteria should be used in designating charter status?

How can "Race to the Top" be used to encourage and support innovation?

- How can the State Board provide leadership for this endeavor?

Relate innovation to the Iowa Core Curriculum.

Master Calendar plans to address the theme of **Innovation**:

- Present at least one innovative program at each State Board meeting throughout the year
- Innovative program – eSigourney Entrepreneurial Academy for Leadership – September 2009
- Innovative facility -- visit a green and sustainable school in the Iowa City School District – September 2009
- Update on new Iowa Department of Education data systems: EdInsight and E-Transcript / Student Record Exchange – September 2009
- American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA); Race to the Top – November 2009
- Work Session on Innovation – Board Discussion – What does innovation mean to the Board? What criteria should be used to determine that a program is innovative? How do charter schools fit with or support innovation in Iowa? – January 2010
- Charter School Renewal(s) – January 2010
- Iowa Central Biosciences Program – innovative building and structure of programs – January 2010
- Highlight an innovative program from outside the state or country (may utilize technology) – January 2010
- Community College Green Jobs / Weatherization Program – innovative collaboration and program delivery – March 2010
- Report from the Technology Task Force – March 2010
- Innovative Uses of Technology – May 2010

Engagement

Notes from State Board and Department discussion:

Education reform and innovation require buy-in from parents and communities.

In order to convince people that change is necessary, the argument must be logical, concrete, and credible. It must also evolve from the historical and address the emotional.

In order to get people to buy into the need for change, you have to make people think there's a "problem" first. While creating a sense of urgency, the public needs to know what is planned to assist in any change that is needed and how it will benefit students.

Continue community visits – develop a long range plan over multiple years.

- Plan well in advance so that State Board members can participate.

Youth Voices

- How can we get more student input into policy decisions?

How do we work with our other state partners (IPTV, State Library)?

- What are some of the ways that we collaborate?

Meet jointly with other education groups such as the Iowa Association of School Boards (IASB), Iowa Association of Community College Trustees (IACCT), Area Education Agencies (AEAs), School Administrators of Iowa (SAI), Board of Educational Examiners (BoEE), etc. as needed.

- Meet with education groups when there is a specific reason to meet.
- Meet jointly with one education or stakeholder group every other year (may want to meet with IASB more often).
- State Board members may attend the education organization conferences in which they are most interested, present on behalf of the State Board, and exchange information about priorities, initiatives, and issues.

Relate engagement to the Iowa Core Curriculum.

Master Calendar plans to address the theme of **Engagement**:

- Schedule approximately four community conversations over the next year (2009-2010). At these meetings, the Director and State Board members will meet with local school districts and members of communities to discuss how schools, parents and the community can work together to improve the quality of their schools and increase student achievement.
- Plan State Board visits to school districts, community colleges, and programs when possible (i.e. visit the Iowa City Community School District – September 2009)
- Meet jointly with the IASB Executive Board – November 2009 – Attend the IASB annual conference
- Honors and Recognition: Breaking Barriers Awards – November 2009
- Report on “Creating a Sense of Urgency for Change” campaign – March 2010
- Student voices – invite a panel of students to share their perceptions and suggestions related to education – March 2010
- Meet with representatives from the Board of Educational Examiners – May 2010
- Schedule a session on how community colleges engage business leaders – May 2010
- Presentation on collaborative initiatives with Iowa Public Television – July 2010
- Continue to invite more “real people” – teachers and administrators who are implementing programs – to present to the State Board throughout the year

Quality

Notes from State Board and Department discussion:

The Iowa Core Curriculum is designed to increase the quality of instruction. How are districts using the Core and 21st century skills to move content areas forward? Invite local school districts to discuss how they are implementing the Core Curriculum.

How can we personalize education and meet individual needs while maintaining high standards for all?

Invite first and second year teachers and teacher interns to meet with the State Board to discuss how well prepared they feel coming out of teacher preparation programs.

How do AEAs support quality education?

Master Calendar plans to address the theme of Quality:

- Providing quality data – Update on new Iowa Department of Education data systems: EdInsight and E-transcript / Student Record Exchange – September 2009
- Highlight examples of quality instruction related to the Iowa Core Curriculum (provide one example related to content and one related to 21st century skills – a video is being developed to demonstrate one of the content areas) – March 2010 and May 2010
- Invite a panel of first and second year teachers and teacher interns to discuss the quality of their preparation programs and the quality of the support they are currently receiving – July 2010
- Report from the Postsecondary Audit Committee – November 2010
